Founded in 2016, Bangalow Koalas Inc. is a registered environmental organisation that's committed to protecting and saving our Northern Rivers koalas by creating a Koala Wildlife Corridor.

As a registered charity and voluntary community group, to achieve its aim, Bangalow Koalas works with local, state and federal government agencies, NGOs, Landcare groups, fellow community groups, landholders and the local community.

The Organisation's Goal

Bangalow Koalas Inc's vision is to educate, involve and inspire the community. Helping communities restore and connect fragmented habitat into corridors for koalas and other wildlife.

We achieve this through community planting days, educational workshops such as Koala Health and Habitat workshops, Kiddy workshops and Landholder workshops. And also by involving community at fundraising and awareness stalls, farmers' markets and regular e-Newsletters, database reachouts and social media interactions.

Our hands-on community-based response to the climate crisis is connecting individuals, families, communities, indigenous and Landcare groups in a collaborative effort to give us all hope, especially our children, that change is possible.

With the organisation's main goal being the establishment of the Koala Wildlife Corridor, it's on track to plant 500,000 trees by the end of 2025.

Trees and Plantings

Properties planted since 2019:

119 plantings on 90 properties in six shires

President's Report



What a year 2022/2023 has been. We recovered from the devastating flooding events earlier in 2022, where the rain didn't stop until June 2022, to finish off the fiscal year of 2022 planting 82,968 trees plus an additional 25,736 flood recovery infills.

We then began plantings again in March 2023 and have planted every month since. This year the issue was severe frosts at some of our sites but luckily overall it wasn't too bad. If it is not drought, bushfires, floods, it's frost... all we have left to deal with is a locust plague and we'll have covered everything!!!

In 2022/2023 we planted 39,130 trees for the final third year of our initial WWF Regenerate Australia – Koalas Forever grant. Thankfully, in August 2023 we signed another WWF Regenerate Australia grant for \$1.21 million for two years, taking us through to 2025.

We've also launched our 500,000 Reasons for Hope campaign, which is our goal to plant 500,000 trees by the end of 2025. From humble, small-scale beginnings, now we're planting hope on a game-changing scale – hope for koalas, hope for the planet and, in the face of climate change, hope for mental health and wellbeing of our younger generations.

Since early 2020 we have developed a partnership with One Tree Planted which has enabled us to plant the number of trees we have over the last four years and we are looking forward to working with them ongoing into the future. For 2023, One Tree Planted have also co-funded all our plantings at \$2.18 per tree, which means the ability to make all our grant funding go much further. NSW State Government DPE funded the growing of 50,000 seedlings in 2022 for this year's plantings and will be again for our 2024 planting season. Thanks to Humphrey at Eastern Forest Nursery for nurturing the seedlings and Mark Wilson from Friends of the Koala Native Nursery for lovingly nurturing other koala and rainforest trees. Thanks also to Mark Dunphy and his wonderful crew at Firewheel Nursery for supplying all our other species required, thanks to funding from One Tree Planted.

With these collaborations, and in particular the WWF Australia funding, it therefore comes as no surprise that 2023 saw us reach a monumental milestone – more than 300,000 trees planted since July 2019.

Also, I have been working hard trying to fundraise to keep employing Linda Swankie two days a week, as our admin/ ecological support.

We updated a Gofundme page in May 2023 to try and raise \$40,000 to employ Linda, and although it has only raised \$7,140 so far, we did get other donations direct to us including another \$10,264 from a fabulous member who wishes to remain anonymous, \$10,000 off the Lloyd Martin Family Foundation, and \$5,180 from Sims Ltd.

This help is essential for Bangalow Koalas to continue to grow and thrive into the future and can never be underestimated. I am truly thankful to have Linda take so much pressure off me as we continue to grow and thrive.

As always, it was a busy year applying for grants, writing reports (and now that we have so many grants, that means even more reports!!), administering the grants and hosting events such as Landholder, Koala Health and Habitat and

Kiddy Workshops. We presented at the Great Eastern Ranges 'Connecting People, Connecting Nature' conference at Brisbane in October 2022 and then the week later I was down in Sydney at the Gala Awards night for Australian Geographic Society where I picked up Conservationist of the Year award 2022. Such a huge honour and the best night of my life to receive this prestigious award, I was so honoured and humbled. Linda Swankie also represented Bangalow Koalas at the Koala Conservation Australia Conference at Port Macquarie in May this year, where unbeknownst to us ahead of time, we picked up another award – Community Group Award – which to Linda's shock and horror, meant she had to go and accept the award from Minister for Environment, Penny Sharpe.

We are now partnered with three Indigenous groups, Minyumai Rangers, Githabul Rangers and Jagun Alliance. We have been working with all three groups doing maintenance, plantings and mentoring of the Minyumai Rangers. It has been a wonderful experience and we only hope we can get more funding from the Australian Federal Government to continue this work into the future.

We would not be in the position we are today planting hope on a game-changing scale without our trusted partnership with the wonderful East Coast Bush Regeneration. We are also working with the Lennon Bros Bush Regeneration, Jake and Paddy Lennon, as well as James Middlemiss from Paddock to Rainforest Bush Regeneration, which has allowed us to keep up with the huge numbers we are planting. We keep demanding more of them and they keep delivering. We couldn't have had such a successful year without them all. As always there are many people that make up Bangalow Koalas that I would like to thank. The volunteers who turn up to planting after planting, help with fundraising, man market stalls and knit koalas. Thank you isn't enough to express our appreciation for your support in bringing our crazy aspirations to life.

A big thank you too, to those who find time in their busy schedules to contribute their expertise - Jeannine and Dom from 2 Camels for their ongoing creative help; Greg Legg-Bagg and Saul Goodwin for photography, videos, advertising, marketing and big ideas; Karen Fittall, still our wordsmith extraordinaire; our clever ecologists, Linda Swankie and Renae Baker; Lindy our Secretary/committee member who with her partner Phil has been manning farmers' markets and volunteering at plantings and helping me out in the office; Seamus Faithfull our tree man for all of his expertise and advice regarding tree species and selection; Charlotte Gittins who is still working remotely helping with our financials, helping write newsletters, and so much more. And last but not least, the father and son duo of East Coast Bush Regeneration, Rossco and Seamus Faithfull, for their sense of humour, indispensable work ethic and selective answering of my calls and emails, Jake and Paddy Lennon for continuing to support us and for the first time this year James Middlemiss for stepping up to assist us plant all these hope trees.

Finally, to our landholders, we are always grateful for your willingness to be a part of this mission.
